NOTICE TO NURSES

It is common knowledge among the veterinary industry and in particular, among the veterinary nursing profession, that life as a veterinary nurse has many challenges and many registrants face difficulties within employment. These issues were also highlighted in the National Veterinary Nurse Profession Survey conducted by the Veterinary Council of Ireland in 2016.

It is accepted that the profession has come some way since its inclusion in the Veterinary Practice Act 2005 as a legally recognised and regulated profession with a greater number of veterinary nurses being employed throughout the country and the advancement of veterinary nursing education. However, despite these developments the profession continues to face significant problems. Problems which are resulting in an exorbitant loss of professionals leaving the register each year with over 33% of eligible VNs choosing not to work in the industry as of 2017.

In light of this, a working group was formed and adopted as a subcommittee to the IVNA with its sole purpose to explore and implement initiatives to further develop a sustainable and healthy profession for the future.

The first task assigned to the committee is to launch an up to date professional survey which can be compared to that completed in 2016 to establish trends and highlight ongoing issues. This survey will be promoted to IVNA members and followers via social media, CVE events and through the website, ivna.ie.

We urge all veterinary nurses to join us in contributing to this latest survey and help influence your profession today.

IVNA CHARITY OF THE YEAR

The IVNA's charity of the year this year is a Cork-based cat charity called Community Cats Network (CCN).

CCN is a registered charity promoting the welfare of community cats and the benefits of Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR). It was formed in April 2012 by a group of cat lovers dedicated to improving the living conditions of feral and stray cats in Ireland. Their primary activity is TNR, which they believe is the only humane solution to control the cat population. They maintain that unless there is an obvious danger to the welfare of the cat, ferals should remain in their home environment.

CCN believe that everyone should take responsibility for stray and feral cats/kittens living in their community. They are not a rescue and cannot take them in, however they can offer support to the public and help them to solve their own problem either by organising a TNR project, facilitating the reunion of lost cats with their owners or helping with adoption of socialised kittens and friendly strays via their 'private rehoming' section (see communitycatsnetwork.wordpress.com).
